A Huge Thanks for Another Record-Breaking Year! The Japan Foundation Touring Film Programme 2025 (JFTFP25)

On 31 March, the JFTFP25 drew to a close, bringing to an end 262 screenings of 26 films across 33 cinemas in 32 cities and further cementing the programme's position as the UK's biggest festival of Japanese cinema.

In its 22nd year, the programme finally broke the 10,000-attendee barrier, with a final attendance figure of 11,952. Our top five highest-rated films, as chosen by you, were YASUDA Junichi's *A Samurai in Time*, SHIRAISHI Kazuya's *Bushido*, YAMASHITA Nobuhiro's *Let's Go Karaoke!*, MIYAKE Sho's *All the Long Nights*, and SEKINE Kosai's *Stay Mum*.

We were also delighted to welcome two special guests to the UK as part of this year's programme, who toured various venues around the UK giving fascinating insights into their works during post-screening Q&A sessions: **SEKINE Kosai**, director of *Stay Mum*, and **TODA Akihiro**, director of *Ichiko*.
